World Affairs Are Your Affairs

For the past 100 years, CCWA has brought us together for community conversations on U.S. foreign policy and global issues. We firmly believe that "world affairs are your affairs," and bringing our community together to discuss these issues is at the heart of our mission. This past year, we engaged over 1,021 attendees at our Foreign Policy Forums, Cleveland Committee on Foreign Relations events, and programs hosted by our Young Professionals Advisory Committee.

FOCUS ON STUDENTS & YOUNG AUDIENCES

We were excited to kick off our 2022-2023 season with our announcement that students can now attend our public Foreign Policy Forums for free, thanks to a generous donation from Dr. and Mrs. Wael and Sawssan Khoury.

"World affairs belong to everyone. Being able to welcome all students to CCWA programs for free really underscores that CCWA welcomes all voices to participate in these conversations," reflect Wael and Sawssan on the impact of their gift.

During the 2022-2023 program year, a total of 398 students attended CCWA's speaker forums. In addition, CCWA took 10 of our speakers to local schools to talk to students about world affairs.

Among some of the highlights was a visit by Liana Fix, a German Ukraine expert visiting the Ukrainian students at Tri-C, and one by Jeff Opperman from the World Wildlife Fund (WWF) talking about global water issues at border zones to Beaumont School's environmental science students.

BETTER TOGETHER | This year, our Foreign Policy Forums were all about celebrating community connections, partnerships, and collaboration. We connected with the local business community through two global business events, one with Rich Kramer, CEO of Goodyear, and one with the Korea Economic Institute. We partnered with the Ukrainian Archives and Museum and Princeton Association of Northern Ohio to welcome former U.S. Ambassador to Ukraine, Marie Yovanovitch. We brought together local organizations leading Cleveland's response to climate change for a conversation about international climate action. We partnered with the U.S. Department of State to have two distinguished International Women of Courage awardees share their amazing stories with our community, and we worked with the United Nations to host the Under-Secretary-General for Global Communications for a talk on the role of the UN. Our heartfelt thank you to these and all other partners we worked with over the past year to bring globally relevant conversations to Cleveland.

DEVELOPMENT FOR THE WORKPLACE & CLASSROOM

Educational Programs Promote Ongoing Global Exploration

CCWA offers a suite of programs to engage local students, educators and young professionals in deepening their international knowledge and developing global perspectives. Learners of all ages find ways to explore their curiosity through CCWA's global education programs.

GLOBAL GUIDES | During the 2022-2023 school year, we re-imagined our Bridges to the World program. This program offers professional development workshops for educators, and new this year, Global Guides curriculum units for bringing world affairs to classrooms and interactive diplomacy simulations for students facilitated by CCWA.

Local students had the opportunity to pilot two of our new Global Guides through interactive assignments, hands-on experiences, and engaging content. The students explored "Climate Change as an International Crisis," and learned, among other things, about Kiribati, the first country at risk of being swallowed up by rising sea levels as a result of climate change. They also learned about the work of the United Nations and explored the challenges of balancing economic recovery, community-building, security, and governance needs during a peacekeeping operation.

DIPLOMACY SIMULATIONS | During the 2022-2023 school year, CCWA engaged local and international students in diplomacy simulations exploring negotiation, diplomacy and conflict resolution in practice. "My students enjoyed the diplomacy simulation, though were quite frustrated because they realized how difficult it can be to come to a resolution! I am so happy we participated in this experience," reflects Maggie Mueller, a science teacher from Beaumont School, about incorporating the diplomacy simulation into her environmental science class curriculum. The diplomacy simulation gave her students a wider perspective and context for how lessons learned in the classroom relate to international relations and global issues.

LEADS FOR YOUNG PROFESSIONALS

Fourteen local young professionals participated in CCWA's Leadership, Exchange and Diplomacy Scholars (LEADS) program in fall 2022. These emerging leaders learned about Cleveland in the global economy, explored their own leadership styles, heard from changemakers around the world about social and political change in different countries, learned about diplomacy, and explored strategies for cross-cultural communication. "My eyes were opened to how cultural differences play a part in our daily lives. After diving deeper into my own communication style and culture. I feel I have a better understanding of how a miscommunication can be handled — whether it's involving me directly or those I'm supervising," reflects Bre Ganuelas-Tischler on her experience.

Global Conferences Inspire Local Students

A total of 1,563 high school and middle school students stepped in the shoes of diplomats representing countries from Finland to Fiji and worked together to find resolutions to global challenges at CCWA's Model UN conferences.

Model UN opens up a world of possibilities for local students: "Having high quality Model UN conferences this close to home gives my students an opportunity to participate in MUN that they would not have otherwise," reflects Matt Kish, Model UN advisor at North Royalton High School. "The interaction with other Model UN students and CCWA staff is a tremendous experiential learning opportunity for the students. The conferences have encouraged several of my students to look into careers in law, political science, or public policy, where they did

not consider them otherwise. CCWA MUN, simply put, helps open student minds."

In the past year, more than 1,500 students from across the greater Cleveland area have worked together to find resolutions to complex international challenges at MUN conferences. Students discussed topics such as "enhancing education and public awareness on climate change" and "battling resource scarcity in conflict zones." During the 2022-2023 school year, CCWA engaged students from 52 schools through our five Model UN conferences.

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BRINGING THE WORLD TO CLEVELAND

International Visitors Offer Vital Perspective

It is powerful to witness community leaders, innovators, and activists from around the world coming together with their counterparts in Cleveland to learn from one another and talk about how they are going to change the world for the better.

INTERNATIONAL EXCHANGES | During the 2022-2023 program year, CCWA hosted groups on promoting diversity, equity and inclusion, strengthening the rule of law, advancing human rights, promoting sustainability, innovation in education, and more. In total, we hosted 476 visitors from 158 countries through exchanges sponsored by the U.S. Department of State.

Last summer, members of the Roma community in Hungary came to Cleveland to learn about minority community advocacy and to share their struggle to fight for their rights in their country. In October, we hosted our first youth exchange program since the pandemic and welcomed eight high school students from Senegal on a program focusing on youth leadership

and environmentalism. In December, 92 Fulbright scholars from around the world gathered in Cleveland to learn about environmental justice and to share their vision for a more resilient and sustainable future for the planet. In April, we hosted independent journalists from Cameroon, who learned about countering misinformation and experienced a warm Midwest welcome by our citizen diplomats.

CCWA's Citizen Diplomats are the heart and soul of our exchange programs. These local individuals and families open their homes and their hearts to welcome international visitors from around the world. This year, a record number of Citizen Diplomats hosted international exchange participants for dinner or overnight stay.
